BAN LIVE HORSE EXPORTS FOR SLAUGHTER: September 27, 2023 the letter below was emailed to: Prime Minister Trudeau; Lawrence MacAulay, Minister of Agriculture & Agri-Food; Liberal MP Nathaniel Erskine-Smith; Liberal MP Tim Louis; Liberal MP Jenica Atwin; Green Party MPs Elizabeth May and Mike Morrice; Conservative MP Michelle Rempel Garner; NDP MP Alistair MacGregor; Senator Pierre J. Dalphond, Deputy Leader, Senate; Senator Jane Cordy, PSG Senate Leader.

Please move quickly to <u>STOP</u> the export of live horses for slaughter. Every year thousands are transported by air from Canada to Japan for human consumption.

Long distance transport causes them significant stress. They are terrified and may panic, and it puts them at greater risk of injury, illness and sometimes death. Usually, 3 to 4 horses are crammed into small wooden crates.

Horses can spend 11-12 hours waiting for the airplane to take off, and then wait again to be unloaded overseas – during this time horses are deprived of food, water and rest – factor in the flight time and that is a long time during a very frightful situation.

Please hold the Liberal Government to its September 2021 election promise to ban the export of live horses for slaughter for human consumption. What these horses are put though is cruel, inhumane, and it needs to <u>STOP NOW</u>.

Please keep us updated on the outcome of Bill S-270 (An Act to amend the Health of Animals Act and the Agriculture and Agri-Food Administrative Monetary Penalties Regulations (live horses)), and Bill C-355 (An Act to prohibit the export by air of horses for slaughter and to make related amendments to certain Acts).

We hope you will continue working to end this miserable and appalling business for profit.

Green Party MP Elizabeth May responded October 5, 2023: "... I strongly oppose international shipping [of] horses for slaughter. This is a longstanding issue that should have been resolved with legislation much earlier.

I have been deeply concerned with the rights and welfare of all animals for my entire career. I am a fierce advocate of those rights and have written at length on the subject. Canada's treatment of these horses is especially concerning considering the drugs administered to the horses prior to shipment are not in accordance with food safety regulations required for other animals domestically. Canada must treat its animals humanely.

I would absolutely support a bill to restrict the export of horses for slaughter. I have long called for a parliamentary committee on animal welfare. This committee would help to protect and advocate for the rights of horses and other animals. I am continuing to work to develop legislation that would update Canada's Criminal Code as it pertains to animal protection. It would move crimes against animals from the property section and instead recognize animals as conscious beings. We need to demand better regulations for the agriculture sector so inhumane practices such as these can not continue.

... I will continue to advocate for an end to this cruel practice. ..."

Prime Minister Trudeau's office responded October 11, 2023 on his behalf: "... As you know, the *Government of Canada* promised in 2021 to ban the live export of horses for slaughter, and we remain committed to getting this done. **Tim Louis**, the Member of Parliament for Kitchener – Conestoga, is scheduled to introduce a Private Members' Bill (PMB) this Fall to help fulfill that promise. **Mr. Louis** has taken a leadership role in the caucus on this file and is looking forward to working with the opposition parties, stakeholders, and activists to ensure the passage of his PMB. Banning the export of live horses for slaughter remains a priority for the government.

Please be assured that the Committee process will give time to stakeholders, such as the **Animal Defence League of Canada**, to provide expert testimony on the impacts of the ban on your sector. **Mr. Louis** and others look forward to your valuable feedback on this PMB, including what support might be necessary during such a transitionary period. ..."

November 15, 2023 email from **Michelle Rempel Garner's** office: PC **MP Rempel Garner** has concerns with Bill C-355 in its current state. She believes the concerns of nearly 400 horse breeders across Canada need to be addressed, the unintentional impact it may have on the well being of horses, and the 2006 US legislation "banning the domestic slaughter of horses unintentionally led to higher abandonment, neglect, and abuse of horses, as breeders had no market to sell to and no income to care for the animals. ... This consideration is worrying both for breeders' livelihoods and horses' welfare, yet Bill C-355 makes no attempt to address it. ..."

<u>BILL C-275, AN ACT TO AMEND THE HEALTH OF ANIMALS ACT</u>: This federal ag-gag Bill is attempting to stop activists/caring individuals from entering buildings/enclosures where animals are kept, and exposing animal cruelty, inhumane animal care/farming practices.

One of *ADLC's* Directors shared the email they received October 12, 2023 from NDP MP Alistair MacGregor. It is a disappointing point of view.: "... The improper care and handling of livestock is certainly a matter of serious concern. Abuse cases have occurred over the years right here in Canada All have been shocking and even horrifying. But they happen only rarely. Any farmer whose livelihood depends on animals will tell you that their utmost concern is for the health and well-being of their animals. ... [*ADLC:* Factory farmers are not that greatly concerned about the health and well-being of their animals, because if they were, they would not be raising their animals on abysmal factory-farms and sending them to cruelty-plagued slaughterhouses.]

Nothing in Bill C-275 would prevent farm workers from continuing to reveal abuse cases in the event of their unusual occurrence. ... well-intended actions can have inverse consequences. Bill C-275 provides what I hope will be stiff penalties to encourage well-meaning animal rights activists not to take risks that outweigh what they see, rightly or wrongly, as the potential rewards. ..."

A second letter from NDP MP MacGregor dated November 3, 2023. "... I am disappointed in the Conservatives, the Bloc Québécois, and the majority of Liberal MPs on the committee who were unreceptive to making reasonable amendments in the interest of increased biosecurity that would have applied equally to all. I was optimistic that, by incorporating the varying viewpoints of farmers and animal rights activists, we could improve this proposed amendment to the *Health of Animals Act* to achieve the goal we all wish to see – the health and safety of animals. Unfortunately, what was allowed to pass at Committee Stage fails to meaningfully achieve that objective. ..."

October 18, 2023 email from *Animal Justice*, Toronto, ON: "... On Monday evening [October 16, 2023], the *House of Commons Agriculture Committee* approved federal ag gag Bill C-275. ...

Now we have to fight to get MPs to vote against the bill when it comes up for a final vote in the *House of Commons* in the next few weeks. ...

[G]etting MPs to vote against the committee is going to be hard ..."

ONTARIO'S AG-GAG LAW BEING CHALLENGED: An October 31, 2023 email from *Animal Justice*: They are challenging Ontario's ag-gag law in Court as of October 30, 2023. "... This is the first time that a judge heard [an] ag gag case in Canada – we're making history ..."

AGRI-BUSINESS FACTORY-FARMS GETTING AWAY WITH ANIMAL CRUELTY: We received information from a Vancouver Humane Society, Vancouver, BC, email dated November 25, 2023. We altered some of the text provided in their form letter. Below is our December 4, 2023 letter emailed to: Pam Alexis, BC NDP Minister of Agriculture and Food; BC MLA Sonia Furstenau, Green Party MPP; BC MLA Adam Olsen, Green Party MPP and BC United MLA Ian Paton, Shadow Minister for Agriculture and Food, etc. (total of 32 MLAs).

RE: The Never-Ending Story of Factory-Farm Animal Abuse.

Once again, we find ourselves writing about another undercover investigation at a BC factory-farm that captured horrific conditions and animal suffering.

The footage (filmed between April and June 2023), said to be from Excelsior Hog Farm in Abbotsford, shows cruel handling practices, including pigs being kicked in the stomach and face, and struck with metal rods and plastic boards; injured pigs with hernias, pressure sores, open wounds and leg injuries; and filthy conditions, including dead and rotting bodies of pigs and partially eaten bodies of piglets, and floors caked in feces and what appears to be blood and feces in some water troughs.

This is not the first time this farm has been accused of inhumane treatment of animals. A 2019 investigation at the farm found dead and dying pigs in unsanitary conditions and cruel handling practices, including piglets being castrated without the use of painkillers. It's shocking that the farm's owners have not been held accountable for this.

HOW MUCH WORSE DOES IT HAVE TO GET TO SHUT THIS FARM DOWN? WHY AREN'T THE OWNERS/OPERATORS/WORKERS BEING CHARGED, PENALIZED (hefty fines and jail time) AND PREVENTED FROM EVER BEING ABLE TO OWN/OPERATE AND WORK ON ANY FARMS THAT HAVE ANIMALS ON THEM? There seems to be little or no incentive for these animal abusers to change their way of doing business because they are getting away with animal cruelty.

This farm is just one example of long-standing and widespread issues within BC's animal agriculture system. Numerous investigations in recent years have found recurring animal suffering on farms in BC. Meaningful action must be taken to protect farmed animals and create transparency and accountability within the animal agriculture industry.

Specifically, we strongly urge you to support and implement the following measures:

- Government-mandated and proactively enforced farmed animal welfare regulations;
- Publicly available reports of independent, third-party audits on farms and in slaughterhouses, including consistent video surveillance monitoring for real transparency; and
- Appropriate deterrents to prevent animal cruelty, including unannounced inspections and effective penalties for industry stakeholders who are found guilty of animal cruelty.

Canadians care deeply about animals, including those raised on farms. We urge you to give this serious issue the urgent attention it deserves, and for much needed changes to be implemented. We look forward to your response.

December 4, 2023 a response from the office of Adam Walker, Independent BC MLA: "... The issues you've raised, specifically the serious alleged animal cruelty and lack of regulation, are indeed substantial and warrant deep consideration.

Please be assured that your concerns will be shared with **MLA Adam Walker**. We recognize the passion and commitment reflected in your correspondence; it's evident that many constituents ... care deeply about the welfare of our animals and desire change within the industry for their better treatment. ..."

Another response from the office of **Adam Walker**, **December 19**, **2023**: "... After we received your email, we have reached out to the *Ministry of Agriculture and food* and below is their response.

• Ensuring animals are treated ethically and with care is a priority for the British Columbia (B.C.) government.

- In B.C., farmed animal welfare is maintained by a broad framework composed of many individuals, organizations, requirements, and voluntary measures.
- The primary legislation protecting animal welfare in B.C. is the <u>Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act</u> (PCAA).
 Under the PCAA, B.C. has some of the strongest penalties in Canada for causing an animal to experience distress.
- Charges under the *PCAA* can be laid against anyone responsible for an animal who causes or permits that animal to experience distress, including owners, managers, and employees. A person convicted of an offence under the *PCAA* is liable to a fine of up to \$75,000 or imprisonment for up to two years, or both. A person may also be prohibited from owning or having custody or control of an animal for a specified period of time.
- The **B.C. Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BC SPCA)** is the designated organization responsible for animal welfare enforcement under the **PCAA**. The organization has broad powers under the **PCAA** to ensure animal welfare is protected, inclusive of the ability to conduct proactive inspections at Commercial Animal Operations under section <u>15.1</u>.
- While the BC SPCA generally conducts its animal welfare investigations in response to complaints, the BC SPCA can also obtain a search warrant (under section 13 of the PCAA) to enter a premises if a BC SPCA agent believes on reasonable grounds that there is an animal in distress on that premises.
- In Spring 2023, the Deputy Minister of the *Ministry of Agriculture and Food* appointed an Advisory Committee to comprehensively review B.C.'s farmed animal welfare framework. The committee is comprised of animal welfare experts (including representation from the agricultural industry, the *BC SPCA*, and academia) and is in the process of preparing a report, with recommendations, to strengthen the framework. On receipt of this report in Winter 2023/2024, the Deputy Minister will determine next steps in relation to the report and its recommendations.
- Anyone with concerns about animal welfare should contact the BC SPCA directly at 1-855-622-7722, as they are
 mandated under the PCAA to respond to animals in distress and investigate any concerns. ..."

ADLC: The BC Minister may be proud of her province's strong penalties and ability to protect the animals, but their legislation is only as good as their ability to enforce it.

WHY IS CANADA'S DEPARTMENT OF NATIONAL DEFENCE STILL MAIMING AND KILLING ANIMALS IN MEDICAL TRAINING?: We emailed a letter to Minister Anand February 1, 2023 (See ADLC Bulletin #201 – SPRING/SUMMER 2023), and received a reply April 5, 2023 (See ADLC Bulletin #202 – FALL/WINTER 2023). An official response to Petition e-4330 (Animals) was tabled in the House of Commons on December 5, 2023. We had signed that Petition March 21, 2023. It asked the "... Minister of National Defence to bring an end to the use of animals in military trauma training and replace them with more advanced, human-relevant and less expensive human patient simulators."

"Response by the Minister of *National Defence*Signed by (Minister or Parliamentary Secretary): Marie-France Lalonde

National Defence uses advanced simulations with life-like mannequins, known as human patient simulators for the majority of its medical training. Live tissue training on an anesthetized pig is used only in circumstances where simulations alone are not feasible, as is the case of Chemical, Biological, Radiological and Nuclear training for medical providers. In these cases, simulators cannot replace the precision and experience gained with live tissue.

During live tissue training, *National Defence* strictly adheres to the guidelines of the Canadian Council on Animal Care (CCAC) (https://ccac.ca/) which establishes the ethical use and care of animals. Further, the use of animals is governed by Defence Administrative Orders and Directive (DAOD) 8014-0 Animal Use in Research and Training and DAOD 8014-1 Management of Animal Use in Research, Teaching and Testing. This is in line with CCAC standards as well as assessments and certifications to ensure consistent application of the standards across Canada.

National Defence actively seeks to refine, reduce and where appropriate replace the use of live animals for research by using alternative experimental techniques. For example, in 2022, National Defence invested approximately \$129,000 in an advanced simulation mannequin or high-fidelity patient simulator, to evaluate its utility to augment medical training provided to CAF members.

The approach of using advanced simulation for the majority of training and live tissue training sparingly offers military medical trainees with the highest calibre medical training possible with the goal of providing premium medical care to CAF members and those they protect, at home or abroad."

RACCOONS AT A RESCUE SANCTUARY SEIZED BY THE ONTARIO MINISTRY OF NATURAL RESOURCES AND

<u>FORESTRY</u>: October 17, 2023 an *ADLC* Director received an email from the *Ottawa-Carleton Wildlife Centre*, Ottawa, ON, regarding a Peterborough wildlife sanctuary that was raided by the Ontario *Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry* in September. We personalized their sample letter, and on October 25 our letter was emailed to over 25 MPPs (a few Conservatives, one Green Party MPP and the majority were to the NDP).

RE: Wildlife in Ontario is Under Attack by the Ontario Government.

Please urge **Premier Doug Ford** to immediately intervene to get the **Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry** (MNRF) under control.

The outrageous September raid on a wildlife rehabilitation facility in Peterborough and the seizure of baby animals has been widely condemned. Shock and anger have been shown by rural and urban residents across Ontario, as evidenced in one petition that has already garnered over 4,000 signatures.

Like the Ontario Greenbelt fiasco, it appears to be yet one more example of **Premier Ford** and a **Minister** either being unaware, uncaring, or unable to control the abusive activities of **government** staff.

What could possibly be behind the *MNRF*'s massive attack that saw between 40-50 conservation officers and police along with a canine unit, helicopter and drones descend on a charity caring for orphaned and injured baby raccoons. They severely traumatized the young staff and volunteers who have devoted months in caring for these animals, harshly separating and throwing individual animals into tiny cages before carting away these terrified and crying juveniles to Codrington, a *MNRF* research facility.

The over-the-top degree of force used by the MNRF in seizing innocent animals and terrorizing community volunteers was uncalled for.

Premier Ford has a responsibility to reign in the rogue activities of the MNRF. In addition to the huge waste of taxpayer dollars, the organized attack on young healthy animals at **Mally's** raises the question of who exactly is in charge of this **Ministry?**

As a first step, **Premier Ford** should order a return of the animals to **Mally's** and an apology to the organization and, especially, the community. It was members of the community that sought help for these orphaned baby animals and who were, without doubt, very grateful that **Mally's** was there to help.

The time for transparency and accountability from the *MNRF* is long overdue. Wildlife in Ontario is under attack by the *Ontario Government*. Other examples: the *government*'s recent consideration of expanding cruel Penned Dog Hunting facilities; and allowing illegal wildlife hunting contests -- conservation officers have <u>not</u> swooped down and stopped/charged participating hunters or the outfitter store owner who has been holding annual illegal hunting contests in the Belleville area.

We hope you will put pressure on the *Government* to do better to protect wildlife, and to work with the wildlife rehabilitation facilities (and not against them), and to get the *Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry* under control. We look forward to hearing from you.

"CONCERNS REGARDING RECENT ACTIONS AGAINST MALLY'S WILDLIFE SANCTUARY", Change.org petition we signed October 19, 2023. The petition requested "... 1. *Immediate Transparency:* We demand to know where our raccoons are and how they are faring after their abrupt removal from our wildlife rehabilitation facility. 2. *Safe Return:* We implore the *Ministry* to return these raccoons to *Mally's* wildlife rehabilitation facility, their home of love and care, where they were on their way to rehabilitation and a chance at returning to the wild. 3. *Investigation:* We call for a thorough and impartial investigation into the *Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF)* actions, ensuring that the truth comes to light. 4. *Accountability:* Those responsible for these actions must be held accountable, and ethical treatment of our wildlife must always be the priority. ..."

<u>DUCKS UNLIMITED – Whose Side Are They On? Ducks or Hunters?</u> <u>Ducks Unlimited</u> does do conservation work and does care about the erosion of waterfowl habitat, but they also "... value and enjoy the sport and heritage of hunting. ..." [Their US website.]

Ducks Unlimited Canada (DUC): "... We regard waterfowl hunting, conducted in a legal and sustainable manner, as a legitimate and acceptable use of a renewable resource. ..." [**DUC** website.]

"Some green charity heads bring home big pay", The Ottawa Citizen, Ottawa, ON, January 5, 2024: **Ducks Unlimited**Canada was the charity with the highest-paid executives based on a group of 17 charities in two specific categories, and "...

Governments contributed just over \$27 million to **Ducks Unlimited** for its year ending March 31, 2023 ..." [Analysis done by the Canadian Press. **ADLC:** Why were Governments so generous with Canadian taxpayers' money?]

ADLC'S SPAY/NEUTER FUND AND ANIMALS IN DISTRESS FUND: ADLC does not subsidize cats/dogs with poor veterinarian's prognosis – but we help with the cost of euthanasia in some cases. ADLC does not subsidize if there is no committed foster/permanent home or caretaker. From August to the end of December 2023 we helped three individuals: with 4 cats: eye infection and not feeling well. We helped cat rescuers with some of the cost of 10 spays/neuters, 3 vaccinations/deworming/defleaing, 1 euthanasia, and various medications, cat food. We continue our monthly cat/dog food deliveries to Parkdale Food Centre, St. Joe's Women's Centre and St. Joe's Supper Table, all in Ottawa. The Supper Table shares with a second centre they run on Wiggins Private. Your support has made this possible. We thank you.

NEW ADLC SPAY PROJECT: This project began in early 2023 with the help of the Ottawa Spay/Neuter Clinic. Every month we will contribute towards half the cost of spaying 3 dogs. To qualify individuals must either be living in Ottawa Community Housing, or receiving Ontario Disability Support Payments (ODSP), or income through Ontario Works (OW). Those individuals booking the spay appointments would have to pay half of the cost as well. Should the three monthly spots not be filled by someone living in Ottawa Community Housing, or receiving help from ODSP or OW, then one female dog through the **Community Veterinary Outreach** organization can fill one monthly spot as long as the **Community Veterinary Outreach** organization covers half of the cost. In 2023, 8 dogs were spayed through this project.

<u>ADLC's SPAY/NEUTER FUND AND ALTERNATIVE RESEARCH FUND</u>: A full page ad was placed in the Fall/Winter 2023-24 *ULTIMATE GUIDE to Retirement Living*, Ottawa edition. Our ad promoted *ADLC's* Spay/Neuter Fund and non-animal-using Alternative Research Fund.
